# Sheffield businesses rise to the challenge

The Master Cutler's Challenge is the annual event which sees businesses, groups and individuals sign up to use their entrepreneurial skills and teamwork to make as much money as possible, all in the name of charity.

The 2019 challenge – hosted by 2019 Master Cutler Nick Cragg was supported by more than 90 businesses across Sheffield and Rotherham, with activities ranging from dress up days and black tie dinners, concerts and auctions to cycling and rowing challenges and even Tough Mudder events.

The money raised will support the vital work of St Luke's and Rotherham Hospice, with a proportion of the funds also going to the Cutler's Company Charitable Trust, to be donated to a wide range of smaller charities.

### Taking care of those you love

Like so many young couples, Andy and Felicity Gilligan were too busy enjoying their life together with their two young children to think too much about making a Will.

All that changed after Felicity discovered she had inoperable secondary breast cancer and she became a St Luke's patient with just a very short time to live. **"It wasn't meant to be happening, it wasn't what I had planned for my life, for our life,**" Andy says as he recalls how Felicity was guided by solicitors to make a Will in order to plan her family's future. **"They guided some conversations for her so I could find out what she wanted for her children and for me."** 

After Felicity died, Andy realised that he too needed to make his own Will, which is when he took part in our St Luke's Will Month.



"I did the Will for myself and for my boys," he explains. "It just gave me the reassurance that everything was in order."

Our annual Will Month campaign encourages people to make or update their Will to protect their loved ones future. Throughout April, participating solicitors across Sheffield will draw up a basic Will in return for a suggested donation to St Luke's of £100 for a single Will, £150 for a joint Will or £75 for a basic amendment. As well as helping to raise vital funds for St Luke's to care for more people like Felicity, our Will Month also helps people to save up to £100 on the average cost of standard Wills.

### Continuing our outstanding level of care

Regular on the job training is a major part of St Luke's life, helping to maintain our standard and levels of service in all areas.

One of the most important ways of achieving this is through National Vocational Qualifications, better known as NVQs. The NVQ is a work-based qualification, which recognises the skills and knowledge a person needs to do a job.

The candidate needs to demonstrate and prove their competency in their chosen role or career path.

Our Housekeeping team have recently been completing NVQs to keep abreast with the latest developments in areas such as hygiene and infection control.

Mary Green, Housekeeping Teamleader, for instance, has completed her End of Life course, aimed specifically at learners who are working, or want to work, in health and social care.

"When I mentioned that I was actually looking for a local artist to work with on the second story, Catrina mentioned straight away that her mum is an artist," said Tracey.

"Pamela did some initial drawings of prairie dogs which were absolutely wonderful and from there we liaised together. Even though she has been an artist for many years, this is her first book and I think the results are absolutely incredible." Pamela said: "I was thrilled and honoured when Tracey gave me this commission, which gave me a real boost. I have been receiving treatment for cancer, so having something like this to work on really lifted me out of the doldrums and it's been a wonderful experience."

### **Zero waste fashion focus**

Throughout November, students from the University of Sheffield were encouraged to think about how they can support our services through recycling and second-hand shopping as part of their zero waste campaign. To get things started a thrift shop and clothes exchange were set up in the Students' Union building on Western Bank. Students and staff could bring their good quality pre-loved clothes and buy other items, with profits and extra clothes going to St Luke's.

Students also visited our flagship shop in Crookes for a day of volunteering support. "Charity shops are an ethical and sustainable alternative to fast fashion and throwaway culture, subjects which our younger supporters are increasingly aware of and keen to promote," said our Head of Retail Marie Egerton.

"Our shops provide good quality products to people at a price they can afford. This is something that the students are very aware of and they are already promoting recycling and the reuse of textile, garments and many other things. Students are also increasingly focussed on social action against fast fashion, and shopping at St Luke's is a fantastic way to do this."

### **A new breed of volunteer!**

### Meet Bruce, our Pets as Therapy dog and companion of Volunteer Hairdresser Erica.

Erica first brought Bruce to St Luke's to visit a friend's mum during her time as a patient, but after seeing the difference that one visit made it was clear that the much-loved family pet could be a perfect candidate for the PAT Dogs scheme.

"The impact of bringing Bruce to St Luke's is massive and everyone wants a piece of him," said Erica.

"Having him at St Luke's also helps to bring a sense of normality; a really normal vibe for patients."

Erica usually brings Bruce to St Luke's on the days that she herself is volunteering and visiting relatives who have become used to his friendly welcome often pop in to our salon specifically to see him. But the biggest difference Bruce has made has definitely been to the lives of animal loving patients.

"We had one patient who had been here for eight weeks and had not seen his own dog at all in that time and who actually said he didn't want his dog to come in," said Erica.

"But one day I brought Bruce in to see him and after that he asked for his dog to be brought in for a visit – that's the difference that Bruce can make."



## Everybody has time for you here

### 9 out of 10 of our patients are cared for in their own homes by our Integrated Community Team.

The regular contact with a Community Nurse is something that has proved invaluable to patients like Kieron, who was referred to our care following a diagnosis of Clear Cell Sarcoma, a rare cancer that is affecting his throat.

After initially feeling wary of his first contact with St Luke's, it wasn't long until 42 year old Kieron began to appreciate the level of care our Community Nurses like Annette, provide for to up to 400 people at any one time.

"I was a bit apprehensive about them coming. I suppose it was that uncertainty about what St Luke's would be able to do for me. But it's been fantastic just knowing that you have someone there who you can turn to. Annette does so much for us – she tweaks my medication when that's needed, answers any questions I might have. She goes above and beyond – she's just brilliant!"

Kieron has also started attending our Active Intervention Centre, to receive physiotherapy sessions, designed to enable patients to maintain or regain strength, movement and functional independence.

These visits have also given him and Helen the chance to discover the high standard of food on offer in the St Luke's cafeteria.

"It's worth coming just for the food! But what's even better is that feeling that everybody has time for you here."

# Mixing with the community

Clifford House first opened two years ago to provide a sociable, open space for people affected by an illness that has no cure, at any stage of that journey, to give them the chance to take part in creative and wellbeing activities whilst finding support from others living with illness.

Some people come alone and others come with their partner, like Jeff and Liz. After 53 years of happy marriage Jeff and Liz don't feel the need to be together every minute of the day, so although they arrive at Clifford House together, that doesn't mean they have to share the same activities.

It was a neighbour that suggested that the couple should attend Clifford House sessions, especially as Jeff is currently receiving treatment for cancer. Being part of the Clifford House family has given them both the chance to meet new friends and discover new talents, from indoor bowls to yoga and art!

"I thought coming to Clifford House would be a good idea because if anything happened to me Liz could keep on coming by herself. We only came to Sheffield four years ago to be nearer to our children and Clifford House has given us a way of mixing with the community. We have thoroughly enjoyed it and even if we do arrive together we don't mind if we aren't in the same room!"
