

RESEARCH ACTIVITY UPDATE

Some of our amazing team members at St Luke's have recently submitted poster presentations to the **Palliative Care Congress 2025**, hosted by The Association for Palliative Medicine. This exciting event is a fantastic platform for professionals to share new ideas, champion compassionate care, and help shape the future of palliative medicine. Our Leadership Fellow for Project ECHO, Jane Manson, submitted her poster on 'Understanding current UK models of adult community palliative rehabilitation delivery'. Itzel Valderrama Benitez's poster explored 'The perspectives of nurses on roles of chaplains'. while Senior House Officer Elizabeth Parry's paper examined 'What is known about dying in patients with motor-neurone disease, and the recognition of dying by healthcare professionals'. Meanwhile, Joseph Burdon shared presentation on a 'Survey study exploring acceptability of sedation arising from pain relieving medication in palliative care'. We're proud to see our team contributing to such meaningful conversations!

CHELsea II was the very first interventional study here at St Luke's! As we reflect on this important milestone, we're keen to understand what taking part in a study like this really means, not just in terms of results, but how it impacts individuals, teams, and the organisation as a whole. That's where the VICTOR Impact tool comes in. **VICTOR** (Making *Visible the ImpaCTs* Of Research) is a simple online questionnaire designed to help capture those often "invisible" benefits of being involved in research. From personal growth to organisational development, VICTOR will help us see the full picture. The tool will generate a visual report showing the impact of our involvement in CHELsea II, focusing not on the study outcomes itself, but on your experiences and perceptions. We'll be sharing the results with you and our board to help guide and grow our research journey going forward.



DID YOU KNOW?

A comprehensive review of research explored the link between adult-onset hearing loss, dementia, and problems with thinking and memory (cognitive impairment). Researchers found that:

- hearing loss was linked to an increased risk of mild to severe cognitive problems, including mild cognitive impairment and Alzheimer's disease
- hearing loss was not linked to an increased risk of vascular dementia
- the greater the hearing loss, the higher the risk of dementia.

The findings support suggestions that addressing hearing loss might reduce the risk of some types of dementia. Fnd out more here:
